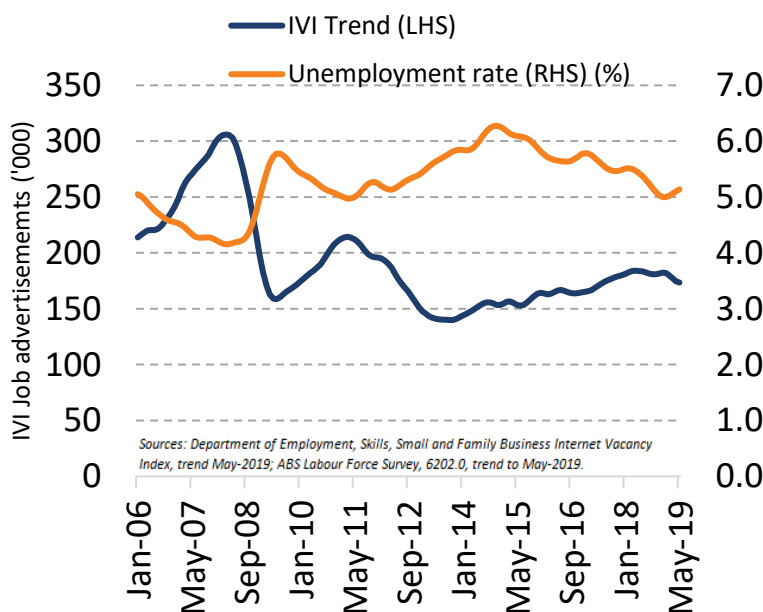
The Internet Vacancy Index (IVI) decreased by 0.7% (or 1300 job advertisements) in May 2019, and has now fallen for five consecutive months.

While the IVI is now 5.7% (or 10,400 job advertisements) below the level recorded a year ago, it remains 15.1% (or 22,700 job advertisements) higher than the level recorded in May 2014.

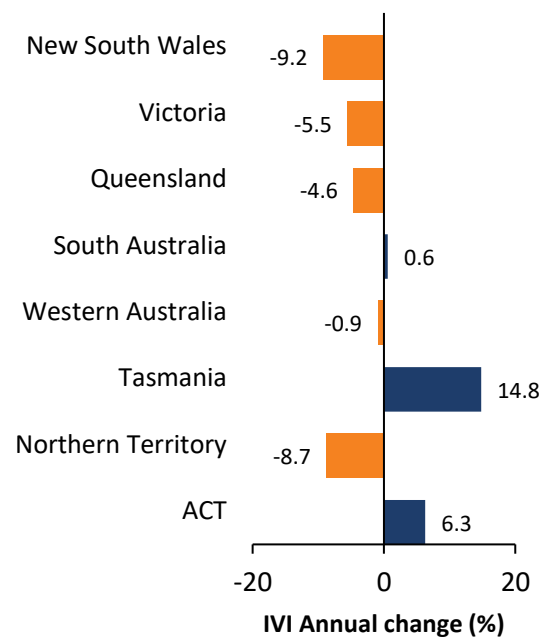

Increases were recorded for Community and Personal Service Workers (up by 4.7%) and Professionals (1.5%).</li> <li>• Job advertisements decreased in four states and the Northern Territory. New South Wales recorded the strongest fall (down by 9.2%), followed by the Northern Territory (8.7%) and Victoria (5.5%). By contrast, job advertisements increased in Tasmania (up by 14.8%), the ACT (6.3%) and South Australia (0.6%).</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• In trend terms, the IVI decreased by 0.7% in May 2019.</li> <li>• Job advertisements decreased in seven of the eight occupational groups, with the strongest falls recorded for Labourers (down by 1.5%) and Managers (1.3%). ## Occupational Groups – Trend Series

Job advertisements decreased in seven of the eight occupational groups in May 2019. The strongest falls were recorded for Labourers (down by 1.5%) and Managers (1.3%). Job advertisements remained steady for Community and Personal Service Workers.

Over the year to May 2019, job advertisements decreased in six of the eight broad occupational groups. The strongest declines were recorded for Machinery Operators and Drivers (down by 17.0%), followed by Labourers (14.7%) and Sales Workers (11.9%). Increases in job advertisements were only recorded for Community and Personal Service Workers (up by 4.7%) and Professionals (1.5%) over the year.

## Detailed Occupations – Trend Series

Over the year to May 2019, 12 of the 48 detailed occupational groups recorded increases in job advertisements. The largest increases in job advertisements at the detailed occupational level were recorded for Health Diagnostic and Therapy Professionals (up by 880 job advertisements), followed by Medical Practitioners and Nurses (760), Education Professionals (710), Carers and Aides (660) and Health and Welfare Support Workers (310).

The largest decreases were recorded for Sales Assistants and Salespersons (down by 1130 job advertisements), followed by Corporate Managers (1060), General-Inquiry Clerks, Call Centre Workers, and Receptionists (1010), Other Labourers<sup>1</sup> (960) and Drivers and Storepersons (830).

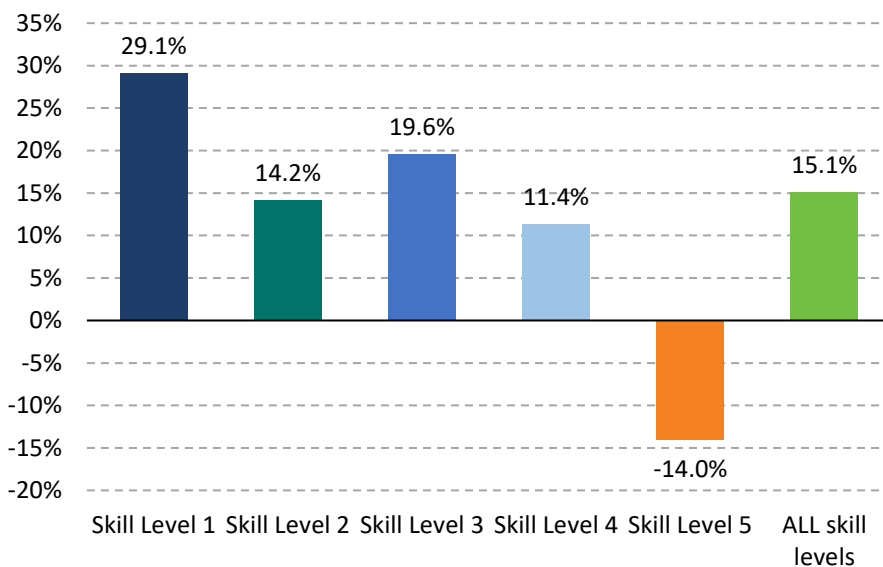
## Skill Level – Trend Series

Over the year to May 2019, job advertisements decreased in all skill level groups. The strongest fall was recorded for Skill Level 5 (commensurate with a Certificate I or secondary education), with job advertisements down by 13.2%. The weakest decrease was recorded for Skill Level 1 (commensurate with a Bachelor degree or higher education), with job advertisements down by 1.3%.

### Five Year Change, by Skill Level



In May 2019, Skill Level 1 accounted for 40.2% of all job advertisements. While Skill Level 1 has always accounted for the largest share of job advertisements, it also has the strongest growth rate of all skill levels groups over the last five years (up by 29.1%).

By contrast, over the five years to May 2019, job advertisements for Skill Level 5 fell by 14.0% and now account for 10.5% of all job advertisements.

## States and Territories – Trend Series

Over the year to May 2019, job advertisements decreased in four states and the Northern Territory. New South Wales recorded the strongest decline (down by 9.2%), followed by the Northern Territory (8.7%) and Victoria (5.5%). By contrast, job advertisements increased in Tasmania (up by 14.8%), the ACT (6.3%) and South Australia (0.6%).

## Regional – Three Month Moving Average

Over the year to May 2019, in three month average terms, job advertisements decreased in 19 of the 37 IVI regions. The strongest decreases in job advertisements were recorded in Darwin (down by 16.0%), followed by Gold Coast QLD (13.3%), Sydney (12.0%), Toowoomba and South West QLD (11.0%) and Gosford & Central Coast NSW (8.8%).

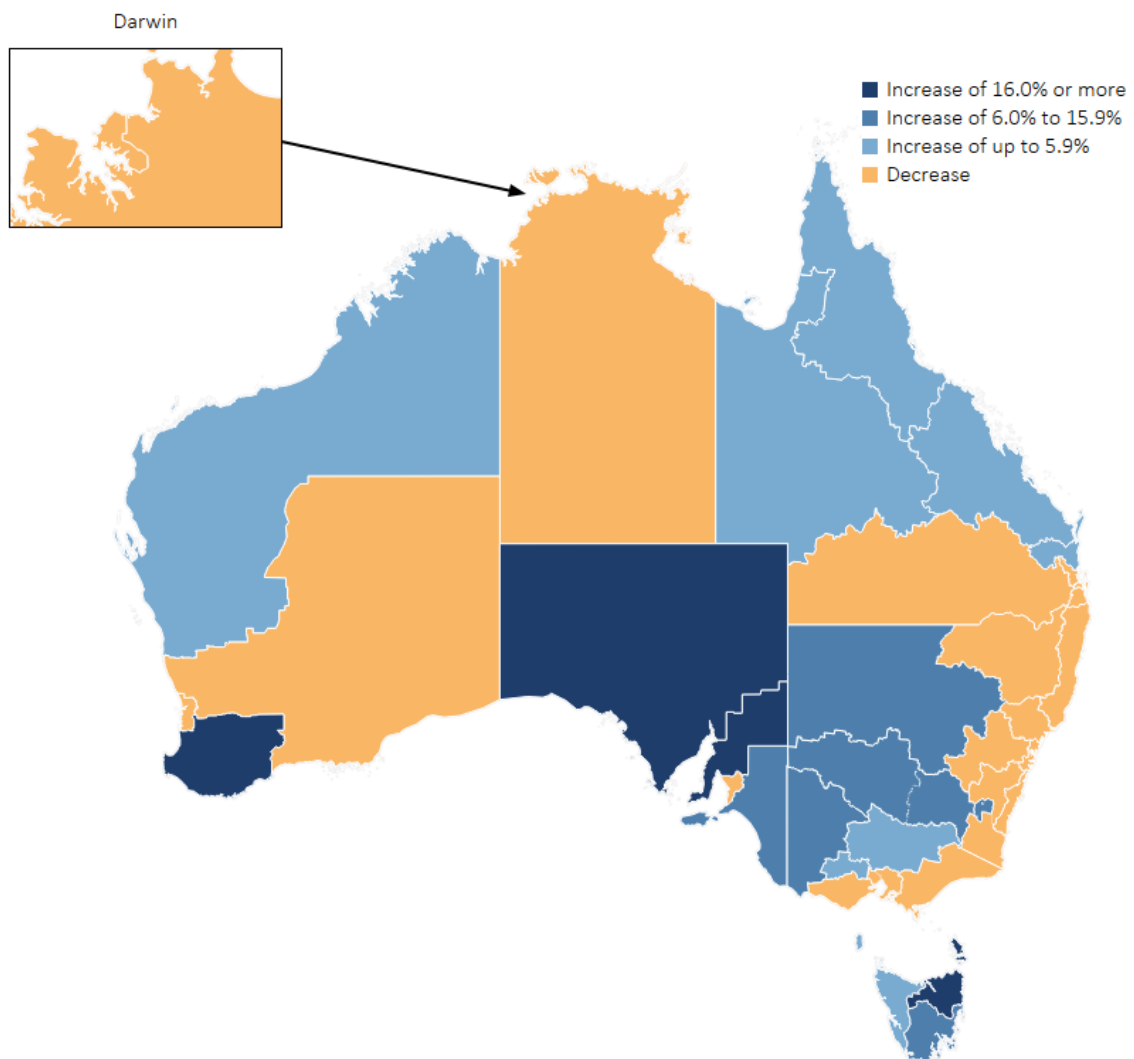
The strongest increases were recorded in Yorke Peninsula & Clare Valley SA (up by 27.0%), South West WA (24.4%), Port Augusta & Eyre Peninsula SA (16.8%), Launceston and Northeast Tasmania (16.3%, albeit from a low base) and Dubbo & Western NSW (14.5%).

Six of the eight capital city regions recorded a decrease in job advertisements over the year to May 2019, with the largest fall in Darwin (down by 16.0%), followed by Sydney (12.0%), Brisbane (7.2%), Melbourne (6.5%), Adelaide (3.0%) and Perth (1.1%).

By contrast, increases were recorded in Hobart & Southeast Tasmania (up by 12.9%) and Canberra & ACT (8.1%).

- Overall the fall in job advertisements was stronger in capital cities (down by 7.5%) than in regional areas (down by 1.1%).

## Explanatory Notes

- The monthly Internet Vacancy Index (IVI) is based on a count of online job advertisements newly lodged on SEEK, CareerOne and Australian JobSearch during the month. Duplicate advertisements are removed before the IVI job advertisements are coded by the Department of Employment, Skills, Small and Family Business to occupations based on the Australian and New Zealand Standard Classification of Occupations (ANZSCO). The data are seasonally adjusted, trended and then indexed (January 2006 = 100).
- The IVI does not reflect the total number of job advertisements in the labour market as it does not include jobs advertised through other online job boards, employer websites, or in newspapers. Nor does it take account of vacancies filled using informal methods such as word of mouth. The IVI also does not take account of multiple positions being advertised in a single job advertisement. In addition, departmental research shows that around one fifth of vacancies are not advertised, with employers instead using informal networks, or selecting from job seekers who have directly approached them about job opportunities.
